## STT Week Academic Writing

Atlantic Language | Galway | Ireland

### Objectives

The purpose of the Erasmus Plus STT week on Academic Writing in Ireland is to foster the advancement of English skills for academic purposes among participants. In the contemporary world the 'publish or perish' academic culture means that it is crucial for academics to use language at an advanced level for the purpose of scientific publication (Scopus®, Web of Science™, etc.) and the preparation of advanced grant proposals (such as Horizon 2020, Fulbright, etc.).

### Programme

This seminar will take place in the beautiful city of Galway, on the Atlantic Ocean coast, known as the cultural capital of Ireland. It will be divided into workshop classes and one-to-one coaching sessions. Participants will be provided with Erasmus Plus Staff Mobility (STT) certificates and EUROPASS upon completion. With a duration of 5 days (25 hours), the seminar also includes a cultural immersion in various activities including an Irish Dance Night and Irish Pub Night. There is also the option of a day-trip to the splendid Aran Islands on Saturday.

### Participants

Participants for the seminar workshops should have an English language skill level of CEFR B2 or higher, and be willing to improve their academic English skills. PhD holders, PhD candidates and other academic staff and team members who want to excel in academic publication and academic public speaking are well-welcome to participate.

### Accommodation

Accommodation is provided by the organizer and included in the price of the seminar.

The organiser offers four options of 7-night (Sat to Sat) accommodation in Galway:

- **Apartment Accommodation.** One room in a shared self-catering apartment
- **Accommodation in Host Families** experiencing an Irish family with half-board Monday to Friday and full-board at the weekend
- **B&B Accommodation** breakfast included
- **Hotel Accommodation** 3 star minimum
